l've judged a schooling show each weekend this month. Schooling shows can be wild, jumping from test to test and intro to Grand Prix. Here are some observations:


1. Be on time for your test. There are generally not warm up stewards at schooling shows, so you are responsible for being on time for your test.
2. Know your test or have it called to you. When you go off course and can't figure out where you went wrong or you go off course multiple times, you put us behind on the schedule.
3. Know the rules! If you have an error, it doesn't mean you leave the ring or you are eliminated. But if you do leave the ring, then you are eliminated! Knowing the rules and being comfortable if you make a mistake will save you a lot of headaches.
4. Know the dimensions of the ring. Making a 20 m circle on a horse is not easy, but if you don't even know where you're supposed to be, that it makes it a whole lot harder. Also, circles and serpentines do not have corners.
5. When you ride by the judge's booth, kindly tell the judge your number and confirm your test. No need to linger and chat, but if your number isn't on the side we can see, that makes it harder for us to confirm who you are.
6. When you ride by the judge's booth, do exactly that! Ride by! Don't stop and let your horse poke his nose into the judge's booth and blow horse boogies all over us and our stuff or knock over our drinks. That is absolutely rude!
7. Do not swear at the judge! Indeed... It actually happened to me this month.
8. Use your manners. If you don't have any, or if they are bad, fix that pronto! When we ask you a question, please don't respond with yeah or yup. A proper yes ma'am, thank you, please etc. will go a long way for a judge's good mood.
9. We are there to judge you against a set of standards that, I promise, we did not make up. We have put a lot of time and effort into our training, yes, even us L grads! Please respect that and know that we would love to give you great big scorebut you have to show us that you deserve great big scores!

## The ABCs of VNBs (aka VADA/Nova Bucks)

This year has brought many changes to a key piece of our volunteer recognition program, VADA/Nova Bucks and so it seemed like a good idea to lay out a step-by-step guide to earning and using your bucks.

Volunteers now earn $\$ 7.50$ VN Bucks for each $1 / 2$ day they volunteer and $\$ 15$ Bucks for each full day and this increase is retroactive to the beginning of 2023. Great you say, but where exactly are those bucks? Well, that is the other big change in the program for 2023 - the entire process of receiving and redeeming bucks is now electronic, via the VN website. There were several reasons for this change: it's always good to save a few trees, it's easier to post them on-line then to distribute them manually, it is now impossible for the recipient to lose their bucks, and most importantly, VN can now track its outstanding liability in this area, which is an important part of good fiscal management. All paper bucks that were turned back in to VN by the deadline were converted to an on-line award and those bucks have an expiration date of $12 / 31 / 23$. Bucks earned from this year on have an expiration date of one year from the date earned. To see your outstanding buck balance, log on to vadanova.org. On the upper right-hand side of the page, click on your name and then your profile. Once your profile opens, scroll down to the box marked "Histories" and click on "Payment/ Credit History" and voila - there under credits you will find all your current bucks available for your use.


Which brings us to the next set of questions - what exactly can I do with my VN Bucks and how do I actually use them? VN Bucks may be used towards your membership (and remember, joining VADA/Nova means you are automatically also a VADA member and a GM Member of USDF) and towards entry/ registration fees for our schooling shows and clinics (unfortunately, due to USEF regulations, they cannot be applied to license show entry fees.) Here is a summary of how to use/spend your Bucks for VADA Nova events, clinics, and schooling shows:
> **Membership, Clinics, Events and Educational Seminars with Registration Directly on the VN Website when finalizing your registration and payment information, you can choose to apply all or a portion of your Volunteer Bucks balance to the amount due. The system will automatically deduct them and adjust your available credits in your member profile.

**Schooling Shows with Registration on Strider Pro Volunteer Bucks cannot be applied directly to your show registration/ balance due when using Strider Pro. Contact the show Secretary directly if you wish to use all or any portion of your Volunteer Bucks credits toward your show entry fees. Once you have let the Secretary know what amount you would like to apply, and the entry fees have been paid in full on Strider Pro, the VN Treasurer will refund the equivalent amount back to your credit card, and the Volunteer Bucks will be adjusted in your member profile accordingly.

In addition to using your hard-earned bucks for VN events, a growing number of merchants, vendors and service providers have signed up to participate in the program. To use your bucks with these merchants, go back to the home page of the website, hover over Volunteering, then click on "Bucks Store." There you will see all the businesses that accept VN Bucks. Once you decide how/where you want to use your bucks with any of the listed merchants, simply click on the gift certificate(s) in the denominations you want and they will be added to your cart. Follow the instructions to checkout and once the transaction is

completed that amount will be deducted from your credit balance. You will then receive an email confirming your purchase. While you can print the actual gift certificate and may want to do so for your records, it is not necessary that you do so. What you do need to print and bring to the merchant to redeem is the email confirmation from VN that contains all the details you need to redeem your certificate, including the vital Order ID number and the order date. The gift certificate expires one year from the date you ordered it. Pretty simple once you get the hang of it!

The program is a win/win for all. As a small thank you for volunteering, you get to use your bucks to offset the expense of a VN activity or shop with and support your favorite merchants (or discover some new ones.) These merchants then submit the gift certificates to VN for full reimbursement. So, go on-line and start shopping if you have accumulated bucks and if not, remember to go on-line to look for upcoming volunteer opportunities and start earning them now!

## WHEN IN VIENNA

International business travel has its pluses and minuses, but if you're a rider and dressage is your discipline, having a little spare time in Vienna definitely has its advantages. My first visit to the Spanish Riding School (SRS) was while I was still in high school, many decades ago. At that time, we only took a tour through the building, but I was already star struck after seeing the Disney movie, 'Miracle of the White Stallions,' and remember scooping up a little footing from the ring in a Kodak film box (anyone remember those?) and carrying it home where it lived in my room for years. Over time, I saw the actual performance several times, but later in my career when I had to visit Vienna on a regular basis, I discovered that the SRS offered the opportunity to watch the morning training sessions. If you're a dressage rider, the performances are awe-inspiring and spectacular in their precision and tradition, but the training rides - that is where you can see the work that goes into producing the brilliance of the performances.
Over the years, the SRS has sometimes struggled financially and has had to look for ways to generate income. Opening the morning training was one of those ways. I have been many times and it is impressive that they have evolved from just letting peopled in to stand and watch to opening the royal box and other previously restricted areas and having assigned seating.

## Why Do I Love Morning Training?

There are many reasons as a rider to appreciate the training sessions, but one of the things that I have most enjoyed watching evolve is the advancement of women among the rider ranks. Until fairly recently, SRS was an exclusively a male environment for horses and humans. In 2008, SRS approved the admitted its first female student. I remember going to a morning training session and being surprised to see woman. In subsequent years, I saw her continue to train as a student until eventually she appeared in the
brown jacket, buff colored leather breeches, high black boots, and characteristic hat of a rider. This year, there were two women who were riders in the training session, another female student rider, and a woman groom.

The other obvious reason I love to watch the training is to learn. I like to pick a horse and follow it through a series of exercises to see how the horse and rider work together. Typically, the one-hour training session that is open to the public is divided into two thirtyminute sessions with 5-6 horses in each session. The first session has the more advanced horses. When I was in Vienna in late May 2023, one of the senior horses was in the first group. They can be distinguished by their tack (the glitter of the bridle stands out) and by the seniority of the rider. The first group of horses were mostly ridden in double bridles, but with quite loose contact with the curb. The riders work mostly on relaxation, of course, and keeping the horses sharp in their responses and movements. Even the most advanced horses may be assisted from the ground for movements like passage.
One of the things that struck me watching this group was the efficiency of movement. It wasn't flashy or extravagant, but was precise, deliberate, and cadenced, things we all aspire to, but that these horses and riders achieve at a very high level.

Another observation: so000000 many transitions. This was true of both groups, but even within a relatively short 30 minutes school (including warm up and cool down on a long rein), transitions were frequent and often to a relaxed walk. If the rider asked for a more demanding exercise, a quick sugar cube taken from a pocket in the left coat tail often followed.

We were treated to see some of the advanced movements as well, including the levade both mounted and unmounted, along with working piaffe and passage in hand.


The second group of the morning was comprised of fully trained horses who were not quite at performance level. Here we saw younger horses working in snaffle bridles that clearly had not yet developed the musculature and, in some cases, the discipline of the more mature horses. My attention was captured by two of the horses in particular. The first one made me think, "Why is that horse here?" The walk on a long rein looked disjointed and even tending to lateral. His neck hung very low and it was really hard to picture how this horse would move in anything like a balanced, uphill frame. The rider asked for a little trot, then went back to the walk. Then a little more trot, then back to walk. By the time they moved to canter, over half of the session was over and suddenly another horse emerged. Better balanced, more flowing movement, and was he great at lateral movements.
The second horse I followed still had a partially black mane indicating that he was younger, had a level of energy that reminded me of my spicy thoroughbred, but ask for a piaffe or passage and he was clearly in his happy space. You could almost feel him smile; but the canter work? Resistance, a little kicking out and lots of appropriate guidance from the rider to encourage the forward engagement that was needed.
In many ways, the second group showed how important consistent, but gentle corrections are to progressing up the levels. It was also fun to watch all of the same basic training tools we use are the bread and butter of the SRS. Leg yields, shoulder in, shoulder in to half pass, changing directions at the walk through turn on the haunches, training pirouettes, and did I mention, s000000 many transitions.

The live narration that accompanies the training session is good, I think, but the acoustics in the hall are not nearly as magnificent as the decoration. If you know something about dressage, you can mostly follow on your own, but if you don't know about how the riders are trained, you might miss that part of the narrative, which is quite interesting.

## If you want to go

If you know in advance when you will have free time, the easiest thing to do is purchase tickets in advance from the SRS website - https://www.srs.at/en/tickets-events. If you are ordering online and opt to choose your seat, try to select a seat in a front row. The first level is great; second is also fine, but fairly high up. As you can see from the photo of the interior, there are many columns that do an amazing job of blocking your view, so if you see a block of four seats, assume that they are flanked by columns and pick the middle seats. That won't make the columns disappear, but you won't have to crane your neck quite so much.

Some Vienna tours also include the SRS morning training, but may not be very cost effective if you don't have time to take advantage of the other stops that are included. The SRS is located in the middle of Vienna in the Hofberg Palace area, which is a great place to walk or stop and have a coffee. It is just down the street from St. Stephen's Cathedral and adjacent to some great shopping, restaurants and cafes. If you're not staying in the center of Vienna, the public transportation is very convenient, inexpensive, and almost every U-Bahn (subway) line has a stop at or near St. Stephen's Platz. Bikes and scooters are also available to rent.

No tourist attraction is complete without a gift shop and this one has everything you can imagine Spanish Riding School-related. There is also a small cafe with light food. In another effort to generate income, you can also purchase Maestoso Gin, which comes in a quite nice souvenir bottle. Tours of the stable are also available on the website along with an architectural tour of the building.

## TREASURER REPORT 2ND QUARTER 2023 FINANCIAL ACTIVITY

The second quarter of 2023 reflected a very busy period for VADA Nova, with 3 licensed shows on the calendar, one in each month of the quarter.

Our April Spring Dressage licensed show had a smaller footprint than in recent years. The show date fell on Easter weekend and the Board decided it would be prudent to pare it down to a Saturday only, one-day show in 2023. Though we would likely have had entries come in for Easter Sunday, it was going to be a challenge to adequately staff our volunteer contingent on the holiday. In any event, we still attracted adequate entries for a successful show, and earned a profit of $\$ 2,433.8$.
The May 2023 Mid-Week show has proven to be a popular item on the Spring calendar. We continue to get great reviews and many requests to continue this show going forward. It is a great opportunity for riders and horses to compete in in a quieter, lower-key atmosphere before the bigger shows in the Summer. We took a very small loss on this show in the amount of \$209.79.

The Summer Dressage Festival in June is one of our biggest shows on the calendar and the 2023 show was no exception, as horses and riders begin their quests to qualify for National and Regional shows and year end awards. Our show in 2023 realized a healthy profit of $\$ 10,684.96$.
